Artificial Intelligence I (CS3346A), Fall 2024, the lectures will be in person, Tuesdays 2:30-3:30pm ■■■■■ and Fridays 1:30-3:30pm ■■■■■

The course is an introduction to Artificial Intelligence. We will cover the fundamentals used in the construction of intelligent agents, including heuristic search for problem solving, computer games, probabilistic reasoning, Bayesian networks, machine learning including neural networks, ChatGPT (briefly if time allows), and so on.

5. Methods of Evaluation

Grading Scheme and Assessment Dates

The overall course grade will be calculated as listed below:

Three Assignments worth 5% each.

Midterm Test 35% tentatively scheduled on Nov 8 (in-class midterm)

Final exam 50% (covering the whole term)

For both midterm and final exams, students can bring a one-page 8x11 “cheat sheet” (double-sided, written or printed). The exam will be closed book, with no permitted access to any electronic devices. The exam is to be completed individually, with no assistance from others.

All assignments are due by 11:55 pm of the due date, submitted via OWL. The due dates of the three assignments are: 10/8, 11/5, and 12/3 Late Assignment Policy of assignments: Each day (24 hours) is 10% off (e.g., if late for 2 days, 20% off), until 10 days have passed and the assignment will be worth 0.

Accommodated Evaluations

Generally, no extensions to assignments will be given (except for lengthy illness, or other compassionate grounds). In those cases, the course instructor can grant the extension. The instructor may also ask you to take supporting documentation to the office of the Dean of your faculty, who will contact the instructor. If you must miss the Midterm Exam for a valid reason, you must present valid documentation to the Dean's office and get approval there. These students must also notify the course instructor prior to the Midterm Exam. A make-up Midterm will be arranged for these students. If for any reason the assignment schedule given below cannot be adhered to, the assignment marks will be prorated.

However, the following assessments are excluded from this, and therefore always require formal supporting documentation:

- Examinations scheduled during official examination periods (Defined by policy)
- Midterm

When a student *mistakenly* submits their one allowed Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** for the assessments listed above or those in the **Coursework with Assessment Flexibility** section below, the request cannot be recalled and reapplied. This privilege is forfeited.

Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments

When a student misses the Final Exam and their Academic Consideration has been granted, they will be allowed to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam). See the Academic Calendar for details (under [Special Examinations](#)), especially for those who miss multiple final exams within one examination period.

Essential Learning Requirements

Even when Academic Considerations are granted for missed coursework, the following are deemed essential to earn a passing grade.

To pass the course, students must write the midterm and final exams and obtain a minimum of 50% in each.
